Pastor's Page, April 2024 (This month's pastor's page is the first half of my Easter sermon, so it doesn't have and ending, it just ends...)

For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. – Romans 6:23

In his November 2023 Bishop's Newsletter article, Bishop Satterlee made this claim:

I regularly conversed with people who challenged the gospel because they considered death natural, even necessary, for humanity and the planet to evolve. COVID-19 changed that perspective as Death became personal, powerful, pervasive, and, for a time, completely out of our control.

He has made similar claims in other times and places: we used to be able to deny death, but COVID-19 changed our perspective and now we cannot (he's on sabbatical as I write this, so I won't contact him so that he can defend or speak for himself).

I disagree. Best I can tell, we live in a death-denying culture. We want to live forever and we want to be fully able-bodied and good-looking (young) while we do it. We wanted this in 2019 and we want it in 2024. We honestly believe (and I use that word intentionally) that our science and our medicine will make it possible – and for many of us, we survive diseases that would have killed us just a generation or two ago.

This is why we, as a society, can pretend like Death isn't real. (Caveat: parts of our society act like Death is all around us – when it suits their purposes – but that isn't the norm.)

I agree with Bishop Satterlee, however, in that Death becomes personal for all of us, eventually. Most of us aren't involved in mass shootings, but most of us have been impacted by, say, cancer. Or a long, slow illness. Or a tragic accident. Or ... well, you get the point.

For myself, as a military service member and clergy, I am faced with Death regularly. Sometimes it's tragic, sometimes it's a relief. I've buried people younger than me and I've buried people who have suffered the whole time I've know them. It's been my duty to tell families that their loved ones died in uniform. I've had my will and funeral service planned for more than 12 years.

But I know that most people don't like thinking about, or even acknowledging, Death, because when I talk about it and my approach to it (and my own mortality), folks tend to react negatively. Surprisingly few people, even people who could well afford it, have life insurance policies or wills.

Death is a reality, and we can (and do) try to deny it, individually and culturally. But there are glimpses, even in the culture, that it's always around the proverbial corner; whether it's Tim McGraw's "Live like You Were Dying" or Nickelback's "If Today Was Your Last Day," it seems to be inborn: we will all die.

Scripture, and all people everywhere before about 100 years ago, knew that Death was an ever-present reality, and they lived in constant fear of it. It's how rulers ruled – you stepped out of line, you die. "But if you do not worship [the image of my god], you shall immediately be thrown into a furnace of blazing fire, and who is the god that will deliver you out of my hands?" asks King Nebuchadnezzar to the three young men who worship only the LORD.

The Apostle Paul, like everyone else, was well acquainted with Death. "Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death?" he asks in Romans 7:24.

This is the knowledge and assurance that I need to share with those who will listen to the Lord's call.
