Pastor's Page: "The Priesthood of All Believers"

Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.

- The Son of Man, in his glory, at The End of All Things, Matthew 25:40

I preached on this parable less than a month ago as I write this article (Christ the King Sunday, 26 November 2023). Do you remember what I said then? What did he say they were doing? Feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, welcoming the stranger, visiting the sick and imprisoned.

Remember: the Good News here is that Jesus is the sick, imprisoned, stranger, hungry, etc. The Command here is that we who are "better off" need to feed, clothe, visit, etc.

Jesus was not just speaking to pastors – he was speaking to "all the nations."

No, this is not a way for me to get out of visiting you – in fact, I hope to work through the directory in 2024, visiting those who want me to visit.

And, I'm pointing out that Jesus wants you to visit, too.

Lutherans call this "the Priesthood of All Believers," which is where you, the believer in Jesus, represent Christ to the world.

Luther never actually used that phrase (or any of the other phrases, like "the ministry of the baptized" or "the ministry of the laity" [I find some of these insulting] or whatever other phrases Protestants have coined since the Reformation), but he clearly laid out the sentiment more than once:

Hence, all of us who trust in Christ are all priests and kings in Christ, as 1 Pet. 2[:9] states: "You are a chosen race, an acquired people, a royal priesthood and a priestly kingdom, so that you may recount the powers of the one who called you from darkness into his marvelous light."

Accordingly, we are all consecrated priests through baptism, as St. Peter says in 1 Pet. 2[:9], "You are a royal priesthood and a priestly realm."

(Can you tell that Luther really liked 1 Peter 2:9???? 😊)

But they would be thrilled to see you – and so would Jesus... ②

Again, I am thrilled to visit you – expect a call or e-mail sometime in the coming year. But this ministry of visitation – in hospitals and homes, especially when folks are ill or otherwise struggling – belongs to all Christians.
