Pastor's Page, February 2025: Sin/sins

"... all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God..."

- Paul, Romans 3:23

Indeed, I was born guilty, a sinner when my mother conceived me.

Psalm 51:5

This month's word is everybody's favorite topic – Sin!

An old preacher's axiom goes like this: when a parishioner says "preacher, you should preach more about sin," he means you should be preaching about other people's sins. Some Nope, no one gets off the hook on this one (2) (see Romans 3 above).

Really, "sins" are the things that we do wrong; in the words of the confession from the LBW:

We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

Action and inaction, or, by a different set of vocabulary, commission and omission (Matthew 25:31-46). And not just what we do, but what we say and even what we think (Mark 7:1-23, especially v14-23). For Jesus (and for Luther), not preventing something bad that you could have prevented makes you just as guilty as doing that bad thing.

However, "Sin" is different. It's not what you do, it's who you are. This is what makes Lutherans (and Presbyterian/Reformed) Christians different from others. We understand Sin as a condition, not just actions or inactions. The problem wasn't just that

Adam and Eve disobeyed God's order (compare Gen 2:16-17 with Gen 3:1-6), it's that they wanted to be like God (Gen 3:5), to take God's place, to usurp God.

We put ourselves before all others: that's Sin. We put ourselves before God and before all other human beings, we love God and others only after ourselves (if at all), breaking the Greatest Commandment (Mat 22:34-40, in which Jesus quoted from Deut 6:5 and Lev 19:17-18) and Jesus' New Commandment (John 13:34). Inherently selfish, the Reformers described human beings as being "curved in upon ourselves" ("in curvatus in se"). And from Sin comes all other sins. We want to be God, we deny that others are created in God's image, and we treat God's creation as though it was ours to misuse instead of us being God's stewards. This is what we confessed every Sunday in the LBW: that we are captive to Sin and cannot free ourselves.

Sound harsh? It is. It's also true. I'll prove it:

The politician from the other party who is on television espousing a "fact" or a perspective with which you disagree: is that person wrong or is that person dangerous? For people doing something you think is wrong or with which you disagree or you don't like: are they wrong or are they animals? The person at the grocery store taking way too long in front of the dairy section, standing right where you need to be, is that person slow or have little else to do today or is that person standing there just to spite you? Have you ever described another person as "worthless" or "garbage," or thought it? In short, do we think the worst of people, acting as though we know what's going on in their heads or happening in their lives?

If you really believe this last paragraph doesn't apply to you, please come talk to me. But I suspect no one will, because we are all Sinful. We're all in the same Sinful boat. Lutherans think about Sin as an illness or addiction that we all have.

This is why we live the Life of Repentance about which I wrote in last month's newsletter. Because we sin, and because we're Sinful. Because we need to repent, not just of what we did, but who we are.

Well, that was cheery, wasn't it???

FEBRUARY HOLIDAYS




Early on this was the Christian Festival of Candlemas celebrating the Purification of Mary 40 days after the birth of her son, Jesus. On this day she would present Him as her firstborn child (Luke 2:22-38). The day was celebrated by both Roman Catholics and Lutherans throughout Germany

and was often seen as a predictor of Spring. If it was a sunny day there would be a long wait for spring. It seems that the first animal associated with the prediction was the bear and later the Badger. By 1840 in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania the custom grew to associate the Groundhog with the weather prediction for Spring. If he saw his shadow, he would return to his burrow, and we could expect six more weeks of winter before spring arrived.

VALENTINE'S DAY started as a Feast Day for Saint Valentine. He was imprisoned for ministering to Christians under the Roman Empire. According to legend he restored the sight to the daughter of his jailer. Just prior to his death he is said to have written a letter to the jailer's daughter and signed it "Your Valentine". By the 18th century in England, it had become customary for couples to express their love for one another by sending flowers, candy, and cards (known as Valentines).

PRESIDENTS DAY: Both George Washington and Abraham Lincoln have



birthdays in February, so we celebrate both on Presidents Day (February 17th). They have their images sculpted in the Mount Rushmore memorial of South Dakota. This work was done by Gutzon Borglum and completed in 1941. Included in this memorial are the images of Thomas Jefferson and

Theodore Roosevelt. Teddy Roosevelt was included because he was a champion of the National Park system. The memorial is often referred to as the *Shrine of Democracy*.
