Pastor's Page, March 2025: Grace

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— not the result of works, so that no one may boast.

- Ephesians 2:8-9

First, let's state the obvious: "Grace" can be a person's name, like Grace Kelly, the actress from the 1950s who became Princess of Monaco. "Grace" can also be short for "table grace," the prayer before (or even after) a meal. A person can be gracious in his manner or graceful in her movements... Obviously, this is not what Lutherans mean when we use the word, but it is sometimes how people outside the Church understand and use the word.

Even in "church circles" or "among Christians," we can think we know what we mean when we use this word. Except that Christians who are not Lutheran or Reformed use it slightly differently than we do. And sometimes, even Lutherans *know* what it means but don't *act* like it's true.

The above quotation from Ephesians has been called the Lutheran "theme verse." I sum it up this way:

We don't save ourselves; God saves us.

We don't choose God; God chooses us.

Grace is God's unearned love and favor.

Luther summed it up for children this way:

I believe that by my own understanding or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to him, but instead the Holy Spirit has called me through the gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, made me holy and kept me in the true faith, just as he calls, gathers, enlightens, and makes holy the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one

common, true faith. Daily in this Christian church the Holy Spirit abundantly forgives all sins—mine and those of all believers.

- Small Catechism, explanation of the Third Article of the Creed

God's love and favor are unearned. God doesn't forgive you because you made up for whatever you did wrong. God loves you and chooses you because that's what God does and who God is.

You don't earn grace. What you earn is your due. If you earn it, it's not grace.

As the Nazi Party came to power in Germany, Dietrich Bonhoeffer (a Lutheran pastor who resisted the Nazi regime) coined the term "cheap grace," which is when you act like, because God has forgiven you, you can do whatever you want. Paul puts it a little differently:

What then are we to say? Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it?

- Romans 6:-12

I would call this presumptuousness, and we counter it with humility – the acknowledgement that God doesn't *have* to love, choose, or save us.

Nonetheless, God does choose, love, favor, and save us. Not because we're great, but because of who God is. That's Grace.


