Pastor's Page, September 2025: Gratitude / Grateful

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

- 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18, NRSVue

I mean, that exercise is fine, but why just November? Because you want to post about something else the rest of the year! Really, posting something for which you are grateful every day for a month is about reminding yourself and inspiring others how much we all have to give thanks... unless, of course, you're just boasting. In which case, please stop. (Stay with me

Notice, however, that the Apostle Paul does not tell the congregation in Thessalonica to "give thanks for a month." Instead, he tells them to "give thanks in all circumstances." Did he really mean *all* circumstances? Perhaps, because Paul was good at being grateful for the strangest things, as he tells the Christian congregation in Corinth: "Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ, for whenever I am weak, then I am strong." (2 Corinthians 12:10)

While Paul was grateful for whatever he understood to come from God to further his proclamation of Christ, I am not necessarily telling you to show gratitude for hardships. I am saying that gratitude is a state of being. It's a Christian's natural reaction to all that God has given.

I know how hard it can be to grateful when the world seems against you, when your suffering seems to have no point, or when life just sucks. And so does Paul. He tells the Christians in Rome to "weep with those who weep." (Romans 12:15) and the Christians in Thessalonica to grieve and comfort as those who have hope (1 Thessalonians 4:13, 18).

In this way, Paul demonstrates that gratitude is less what we do or say and more of a posture before God, a way of understanding ourselves and our lives before, and in relationship with a good, holy, and beneficent God. In Christ, we have the hope to give thanks in *all* circumstances, knowing that God brings good from evil:

We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called, and those whom he called he also justified, and those whom he justified he also glorified. – Romans 8:28-30, NRSVue

I think, in the end, gratitude is also like a muscle that we exercise. The more we do it, the better we are at it, until it becomes a part of us. When it's a part of us, it's a part of our relationship with God. And in Christ, we worship a God who has given us the ultimate gift for which to be grateful: new life in Christ.

Pam's Memorial

THANK YOU to everyone who made Pam's memorial ceremony go so well. From the sacristy team to everyone who donated foodstuff or materiel to the luncheon to those who set up before, served

during, and/or cleaned up after Pam's ice cream social. It went as smoothly as I could have hoped, I know Deb was pleased, and her family expressed their gratitude.

Funerals:

First, I have included both a blank copy of the funeral planning worksheet and one that I have filled out for myself as an example (though if I were to die tomorrow, hopefully in some absurdly heroic way, it really is the funeral I would like). I have now officiated at least four since I've been at Immanuel funerals where the family expressed, repeatedly and often, how grateful they were that their deceased loved one had written down their wishes for their funeral.

Is death pleasant to think about? No. But it's coming for all of us whether we like it or not. So, I provide you with the same tools I use myself.

I have also included a copy of our updated <u>non-member</u> funeral policy, approved by council during our last two meetings. This is a result of the last two and a half years of people contacting me relatively out-of-the-blue with funeral / luncheon requests. And funerals, especially for people we or I don't know, are a fair amount of work. (If you attend here on the regular, but you're not technically a "member," this isn't intended for you.)

As you read it, it probably sounds harsh – and expensive. I want people to think about what they're asking us to provide, especially in combination. Wanting music from YouTube will mean commercials – do you really want commercials in your loved one's funeral? If not, I have to use my phone and speakers (did you notice the speaker roll off the pew in the middle of Pam's memorial service?). If we live-stream such music on YouTube, then we have to worry about legal (copyright) issues.

Also, to the "expensive" part. I plan to make sure that the folks who do the work are reimbursed. For example: if Joyce runs the livestream, she receives the livestream fee.

People don't think about these things when they plan a funeral; all they know is they're grieving and "(I think) this is what (loved one) would have wanted."

But I also want you to think: yes, this is just for non-members. But are your loved ones members of this congregation? Of course, as a active member of this congregation, your funeral will be what you want. But they won't think about these things in the way that you will because they're not here; you are.

NRSV → NRSVue:

In 1989, the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA released the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) of the Bible, a translation that was an update of the Revised Standard Version (RSV, 1952), which was an update of the American Standard Version (1901), which was (sort of) an update of the King James (or Authorized) Version. I will spare you on why these updates were felt to be necessary, except to say that our English language has changed over

time (for example, the last words of the theme song to *The Flintstones* were "we'll have a gay old time.").

Folks like my mother and Craig Satterlee grew up with the RSV (it's still true that Craig Satterlee will cite and/or read aloud the RSV because it's the one he memorized years ago). I grew up with the NRSV. Is it the best translation that ever was or will be? No. Trust me, I know it has flaws (individually and paradigmatically). But it's the one I grew up hearing, the one I studied in college and seminary, and the one from which I have preached and taught for 15 years, so it's the one I know the best. It was also the default translation of the ELCA – they don't mandate that every congregation use it, it's just the translation of the resources they publish.

In 2021, the National Council of Churches released the NRSV Updated Edition (NRSVue; no, I'm not making this up [I'm not that creative]). Attending ELCA conferences / workshops / trainings, and reading the website of other mainline denominations, I knew that the ELCA seemed to be transitioning to the NRSVue, though its primary worship resource, <u>Sundays and Seasons</u>, to which Immanuel has subscribed since long before I arrived, was still based in the NRSV.

A few months ago, the NCC revoked the licensing agreements for the NRSV. You can't even buy the protestant versions online (new) anymore. Our electronic and any new printed materials (<u>Sundays and Seasons</u> is both) from the ELCA have switched to the NRSVue, though most of my printed materials from the last 15 years are from the NRSV.

All of this is to say: there may be times when I stumble over the words of the readings. Bishop-elect Julie Schneider-Thomas' reading was different than what was on the screen because she read from her own printed materials not our screen. I don't hate the NRSVue, I just don't know it yet, and it may be a little while (or a few decades) before I learn it (Craig Satterlee says I never will, that the NRSV is too much a part of me).

Nursery attendant:

Makayla Slater came to our Memorial Day luncheon, and when I spoke to her, I learned that she loves children, and after some conversations and meetings: she has accepted our offer to be our nursery attendant starting on the first Sunday in September. Some of you saw her when she stopped by to meet us one Sunday before worship in August. When you see her, please greet her warmly.

<u>Funeral Luncheons</u>

Members do not die on a schedule, but when they die, they sometimes turn to us for a service and a funeral luncheon. (See above and included information on funerals.) Would you be willing to have your name on a list (or, if we have enough volunteers, one of two lists) to provide foodstuffs and / or supplies for member funerals? We'll probably continue, if at all possible, to have sign-up sheets for set up, break down, and serving.

Non-Member Funeral Policy

Immanuel Lutheran Church, Allegan, MI

As of 18 November 2024 – Updated 21 July 2025 & 18 August 2025

The pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church will have the right of first refusal for all funerals which take place on the congregation's property. The Pastor's fee is \$250.

Notwithstanding #1, families or individuals may rent the property for a funeral and ask their own clergy to preside; in that event, our building use policy applies.

If you are not hiring a funeral director, please know that the following obligations are yours: Grave site preparation

If you want a bulletin other than what Pastor Chris prepares, you are responsible for it.

Any music other than that played by a live musician

Music

Immanuel Lutheran Church's musician, Lori Querback, has right of first refusal for all funerals held at the congregation.

All music must either come from a hymnal or the family must discuss music directly with the musician. The pastor must still approve all music.

The musician's fee is \$100

Luncheons

The cost will be \$200 for the first 50 people and \$100 for each additional 50 people.

Funeral luncheons will consist of sandwiches, salads, and desserts.

Excepting extreme emergencies, the congregation may require one week to plan and execute all funeral luncheons.

If you would like to store food in our kitchen prior to the day of the luncheon, please note that the ongoing ministries of the congregation take precedence.

Grounds

Immanuel Lutheran Church is a congregation with active, ongoing ministries; those ministries take priority (backpacks, weddings, Christmas families, etc.) take precedence.

There will be no pets or emotional support animals in the building; service animals are permitted There will be no smoking in the building and no alcohol (aside from sacramental use) will be permitted on the church property or in the parking lot. Thus, all funeral luncheons held in the fellowship hall will be "dry."

There is no "open carry" on the grounds of Immanuel Lutheran Church.

There will be no tape on the walls.

The janitor's fee is \$50.

Technology

While we can project the service, someone who is not the pastor must agree to run the PowerPoint. If you would like a member of the congregation to run the projector, there will be a \$100 fee.

If you would like the service livestreamed, you must provide the person who will start and stop said livestream, and you are responsible for all copyright or licensing issues arising from it. If you would like a member of the congregation to run the livestream, there will be a \$100 fee.

It is expected that the party using the building and its content will be responsible for it, and will absorb the cost for any and all damages incurred during their use of the building and other contents. It is expected that the site itself will be treated with the utmost respect.

LABOR DAY, celebrated on the first Monday of September, is a U.S.



APOSTLE'S CREED: This creed was widely used as a statement of the Christian faith and likely developed as an expansion of the ancient Roman Creed. The title of "Apostle's Creed" is attributed to Saint Ambrose around

390 CE. This suggests the creed was seen as reflecting the teachings of the apostles (and implied that it may have even been composed by the Apostles) and served as a statement of faith at baptism in the early church. The Great Commission in Matthew 28:19 says; Go therefore and make disciples



of all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Martin Luther even included the Apostle's Creed in his Catechism.

NICENE CREED: This creed originated from the Council of Nicaea in 325 CE. By this time there were many heresies that grew up with the new



Christian community and it was their task to declare the true and Biblical faith. The primary emphasis in this creed is in the *TRINITY*. It begins with *We believe in <u>One</u> God*. Next the definition of Jesus is expanded to <u>One</u> Lord Jesus Christ. And He is begotten, not made; of one essence as the Father. Also, Through Him all things were made which means Jesus was part of creation itself. And finally, the


Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father and the Son, and with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified.

ATHANASIAN CREED: This creed was developed during the sixth century and was intended to put an end to the heresy called Arianism. This

heresy taught that Jesus was not truly divine. And this creed begins with the very clear threat that Whoever will be saved, before all things it is necessary that he hold the catholic faith. The creed then goes into an exhaustive definition of the Trinity. The Father uncreated; the Son uncreated; and the Holy Spirit uncreated. Even so the catholic faith believes that they are not three Almighties; but one Almighty.



And so it is that we confess our faith using all three creeds at various times. And they are the foundation of almost all liturgical Christian faiths.
