

Pastor's Page, October 2025: Adiaphora: Does It Matter? Really? (Probably Not)

Then [Jesus] said to them, "You have a fine way of rejecting the commandment of God in order to keep your tradition! .... thus nullifying the word of God through your tradition that you have handed on.

- Jesus, Mark 7

Therefore, do not let anyone condemn you in matters of food or drink or of observing festivals, new moons, or Sabbaths.

Colossians 2:16

For Reformation Sunday this year, we're going to learn an old Reformation word that is still very important today (stay with me). Adiaphora (ah - dee - ah - for - ah). (Stay with me.) Ironically, it's a word that really matters, even though it literally means "indifferent matters," though Lutherans defined it as "that which is neither commanded nor forbidden by Scripture."

The color of the carpet is the classic example of adiaphora. It doesn't matter. I promise you, it's not in Scripture. But congregations fight over it (it's also the classic / stereotypical of a "stupid church fight," too). You know what else is adiaphora? As I said last year, altar flowers are not in Scripture or our Lutheran Confessions (tradition / theology), either. They're adiaphora.

In fact, most of the things that occupy our time and attention in the congregation fall into the category of "adiaphora." Altar cloths / paraments / vestments? Windows? Cemetery? The Liturgical Calendar? The budget? All adiaphora.

Wait – even the budget? Yes, even the budget. And the congregation's constitution (except where it talks about matters of faith and doctrine, like in chapter 2.)

Because here's the rub – just because Scripture or the Confessions don't mention a topic, doesn't make it unimportant. How we organize ourselves (congregational constitution) matters. How we live in the world (budget) matters (just ask the electric company).

But the concept of adiaphora is very helpful because it puts things into perspective. Jesus institutes the sacraments, promises to convey grace through them, and commands us to baptize and receive the Lord's Supper. The sacraments are not adiaphora.

But whether we call our governing body a "congregational council" or a "session" (Presbyterian) or a "vestry" (Episcopalian) is adiaphora, because that's not in Scripture (I checked); that's much less important than the sacraments.

Just because a thing is adiaphora doesn't automatically make it bad! We don't have to throw it out, stop doing it, or make a change just because it's adiaphora! We just need a little perspective: is this something that is commanded or forbidden?

And, in times of stress or argument, it can help us to ask ourselves: "does this really matter?" I have lots of preferences, but most of them don't matter and I just have to get over myself when I don't get my way.

(On a complete aside, sometimes modern legal matters aren't in Scripture or the Confessions but they really do matter; this is a completely different topic.)

Usually, when I draw hard lines about things we must do or things we absolutely cannot do at Immanuel Lutheran Church (like chips and soda instead of bread and wine for Holy Communion), it's because there's a Scriptural or Confessional reason. Otherwise, I have to remind myself that most of what we do is adiaphora. Not necessarily unimportant, but adiaphora.

ALL HALLOWS DAY (November 1st) dates back to festivals of the church as early as the fourth century. It is a day when Christians would honor all the saints of the church, whether known or unknown. But more specifically, it is a day in which people would honor members of their family that had passed on in Sunday worship service and in special ceremonies at the gravesite. These gravesite rituals would usually include offerings of flowers, candles, and prayers for our loved ones. And we often celebrate and honor the saints within our congregation on All Saints Sunday (November 2nd) by reading the names of those within our community of faith that died during the past year. In many areas the



custom of baking and sharing *Soul Cakes* was a personal way to honor a loved one. Groups of the poor (often children) would go door-to-door collecting these soul cakes in exchange for their prayers for the dead (saints), Many see this as the forerunner to our current practice of Trick-or-Treating. And as they went from door-to-door they would carry lanterns made from hollowed-out turnips called jack-o-lanterns

**HALLOWEEN** thus grew out of these customs for *ALL HALLOWS EVE*. For many young children, the visit to the cemetery could be a bit scary. Especially when the visit was late in the evening (emphasis upon EVE of).

So we conjure up spooky costumes and stories to add the element of scariness to the event. And if the children come to your door asking for a soul cake, and you turn them away empty-handed, they just might decide that you deserve some mischief!
